
# The Feasibility of Invasion and Annexation of Canada as a US Territory

# Trump's threat to annex Canada is a "real thing"

He tied Trump's push to "absorb" Canada to America's drive to secure "critical minerals"—that is the minerals that are essential for the production of both high-value commodities, from cars to computers, and the making of the advanced weapons and weapon systems needed to wage global war.

### Digital Serves Tax (Amazon. Google, etc) a 3% levy on revenue from Canadian users

Canadian Prime Minister Mark Carney said late Sunday trade talks with U.S. have resumed after Canada rescinded its plan to tax U.S. technology firms.

President Trump called it a "a direct and blatant attack on our country."

Expansionist Policy - the original America as a country only applies to a small piece of the country. The U.S. added 37 states and 14 overseas territories through a mix of annexation, occupation and purchase.

# Canadian History


John Cabot was a navigator and explorer who by his voyages in 1497 and 1498 helped lay the groundwork for the later <u>British claim to Canada</u>

He seems to have envisaged, independently of Christopher Columbus, the possibility of reaching Asia by sailing westward

The initial landfall was either on Newfoundland or nearby Cape


Breton Island, however Cabot believed that he had reached the northeast coast of Asia






#### Voyageurs / Coureurs des bois A Life of Complete Independence

French boys were sent to live among First Nation tribes to learn their languages in order to serve as interpreters, in the hope of persuading the natives to trade with the French






### About 1,000 Canadians joined the colonial army and fought in the American Revolution




Throughout the Thirteen

# The Great Migration from Britain was a period of high settlement in Canada from 1815 to 1850 British subjects were "domiciled" in Canada, but all others required permission to land





The French left Canada after the 7 Years War in 1763

1867 – Canadian provinces become a Dominion, i.e., a self-governing colony of the British empire - last to join was in 1949

In the 1931 Statute of Westminster ended all legislative supremacy of the British Parliament over the dominion parliaments, and made them sovereign states sharing a common crown

Colonial status continued until 1982

Problems in the Three Prairie Provinces
The Red River Rebellion (French: Rébellion de la rivière Rouge)

Métis, whose distinct culture and language emerged after early intermarriage between First Nations women and French fur trappers



The Métis were marginalized by the increasingly English-dominated majority.


A long-term effect of these actions was the bitter alienation felt by Francophones across Canada, and their anger against the repression by their countrymen


#### **USMCA**

(NAFTA)




### The two countries are already united by the Canadian National Railroad







Canada built a transcontinental railroad in 1885 in order to keep British Columbia and other western provinces in the Dominion



The Government of Canada owns approximately 13,000 grain hopper cars, which are provided to the railways at no cost for the transportation of grain from the Prairies.

## Canada has Already Assimilated the Main Features of the American / Western Monoculture



After WW1, and the emergence of the US as a world power, Canada came up with "Defense Scheme No. 1," with a five-pronged plan to send troops across the border and occupy northern cities



Also after WW 1, the US feared the British might launch an invasion - due to the U.S.'s insistence that it repay war loans in full - when Canada's foreign policy was still under British control.



A US plan was prepared, calling for troops marching from Buffalo to take over Niagara Falls, disabling the Canadian power grid. The US built three "civilian airports" on the border with Canada.

### Foreign Affairs

The border between Canada and the United States is the longest international border in the world, 8,891 kilometers (5,525 mi) long



The Communists in China and Russia, North Korea may turn the cold war into a hot one, or proxy war, and provide military assistance to Canada





The Monroe Doctrine, articulated by President James Monroe in 1823, is a significant U.S. foreign policy that opposes European colonialism in the Western Hemisphere.



It asserts that any intervention by foreign powers in the political affairs of the Americas would be viewed as a hostile act against the United States.

### China may intervene for the safety of Asian Canadian immigrants

Since 2000, the People's Republic of China (PRC) has been the largest source of Canadian immigrants.

On average, <u>over 30,000+</u> <u>immigrants from China have</u> <u>arrived annually</u>, and reside in the greater Vancouver or Toronto areas.



Chinese people were the only ethnic group who were required to pay a tax in order to enter Canada.

The Head of the Commonwealth of Nations, King Charles III, a voluntary association of 56 sovereign states, would object but not likely intervene






US will block any UN resolutions condemning an invasion



NATO's Article 5 doesn't come into play, so it is just the U.S. versus Canada - i.e., an armed attack against one member is considered an attack against all members



Canada has just a fraction of the military force of the United States, and it has failed to meet its recruiting goals. Its total strength between active duty and reserve sits at only around 100,000 personnel. The US has over one million troops.

The U.S. would be unstoppable in rolling into Canada's cities, which could likely be taken without much damage.

Most of our northern neighbor's <u>population centers</u>, with the exception of Calgary, Charlottetown, Edmonton, Halifax, and St. Johns <u>are within 80 miles of the U.S. border</u>.



### Canada has 74 main battle tanks US has 9,100 of them

RCAF has 400 very outdated aircraft
US has over 5,000 top of the line aircraft



Naval forces 67 ships vs. 471 ships

The U.S. could take a cue from Germany's invasion of the Netherlands in 1940: surrender or see your cities bombed to rumble. The U.S. Navy could quickly blockade any ports, and the U.S. Air Force would certainly have air superiority.



#### **Asymmetric warfare**

Canada's fighting force could escape further north, its small elite forces would likely disappear into the wilderness, seeking to fight another day.

## Justification for War – Threat to US National Security


Because of it's open door policy, Canada's liberal immigration policy is a portal or doorway for those who would harm the US, like members of drug cartels or Taliban fighters

### Political Opposition to Annexation of Canada



Canada ranks among the world's top producers of 34 identified critical minerals. It boasts active mines, smelters, refineries, and a robust pipeline of advanced-stage across every province and territory



Canada is one of the few Western nations rich in cobalt, graphite, lithium, and nickel, crucial for future batteries and electric vehicles.

## There is an Ecological Mandate to Stop Shale Oil Surface Mining





Danielle Smith, the premier of <u>Alberta</u>, who belongs to the United Conservative Party, said that she would hold a referendum on the province's <u>separation</u> next year. Many Albertans oppose the national Liberal government,

It's the leading producer of fossil fuels for the nation, accounting for 84% of total crude oil production and 61% of total natural gas production.

Alberta under Smith has challenged federal carbon tax, net-zero emissions timelines, and clean energy regulations.

Canada's constitution does not allow unilateral separation.

Only one province, however, has actually held referenda on separating from Canada: Quebec, in 1980 and 1995, both of which showed a majority of Québécois preferred to stay with Canada.



# One Canadian Economy Act

Bill C-5 proposes sweeping new powers that would allow the federal government to fast-track major infrastructure projects

a single federal minister would be authorized to approve projects, override regulatory protections, and bypass environmental and social safeguards all without returning to Parliament for further approval

# Curbing Domestic Unrest

Once the U.S. acquires territories, Article IV, Section 2 of the Constitution grants Congress the authority to manage them:

"The Congress shall have Power to dispose of and make all needful Rules and Regulations respecting Territory and other Property belonging to the United States."









The NWMP, the Mounties, were created to check incursions by Americans into Canada, like the US Border Patrol, or ICE

It was feared that if Canada was unable to maintain law and order in the region the Americans would not leave, and the region would be annexed to the United States.

#### Socialism in Canada

- The Co-operative Commonwealth Federation, or CCF was elected in 1944 in Saskatchewan under the leadership of Tommy Douglas.
- The CCF favored socialist policies, designed to increase government involvement in the economy and improve social programs.
- During the cold war the CCF faced a great deal of criticism and were occasionally denounced as communists.
- In 1961 Douglas resigned from the CCF to become the national leader of the newly organized New Democratic Party (NDP)
- Ultimately the CCF and the NDP under the leadership of Douglas, were responsible for the introduction of Medicare for Canada.
