ELIZABETH GURLEY FLYNN "The Rebel Girl"

*1776

Born in Concord in 1890, Elizabeth Gurley Flynn was a nationally known labor leader. civil libertarian and feminist organizer. She joined the Industrial Workers of the World at age 17 where her fiery speeches earned her the nickname "The Rebel Girl." As a founder of the American Civil Liberties Union, Flynn advocated for women's rights, including supporting their right to vote and access to birth control. She joined the Communist Party in 1936 and was sent to prison in 1951 under the notorious Smith Act. 





An Informed Citizenry

Benjamin Franklin established the Junto, or Club of the Leather Aprons, for workingmen which met weekly. At meetings tradesmen would debate political and economic issues such as "Does the importation of indentured servants increase or decrease the wealth of our country," or "Have you lately observed any encroachment on the just liberties of the people?"

It evolved in a reading society, the first circulating public library, with more books from the pen of John Locke than any other author.

homesteaders cut bricks that were 18 inches wide by 24 inches long and weighed around 50 pounds each. Approximately 3000 bricks were required to build a 16 x 20 foot house























#7 First Vehicle to Go 100 mph on Tracks at Buffalo, NY Central RR, #999

















The Hiawatha locomotives of the "Milwaukee Road" were the fastest of their day, engineered to cruise at 100 mph and surge to 120 if needed.



Flying Scotsman

Per the British, the first locomotive to reach the officially authenticated speed of 100 miles per hour (161 km/h) on 30 November 1934



A TGV (Train à Grande Vitesse) locomotive set a new world speed record for travel on conventional rails at 574.8 km/h (357.2 mph)



4 Ceremonial Spikes at Completion of Transcon RR were used, 2 two golden spikes from California, 1 silver spike from Nevada, and 1 mixed ore/iron one to signify banding the country together.






















10 Remnant Forests with Reported Primitive Hominid Encounters "Area X"




Added Entry: New Harmony, IN, Community of Equality

Robert Owen, a Welsh industrialist and social reformer, purchased a town for \$135,000, and invited people to apply for the 800 spaces that were available to live there, and serve as the model for the communities that would transform world society according to enlightenment principles.

Progressive experiments in education, communal living and science were attempted. Town residents established the first public library, a civic drama club, and a public school system open to men and women.

Owenism stimulated the formation of self-governing workshops, which led to the formation of the National Equitable Labor Exchange, which applied the principle that labor is the source of all wealth. an utopian society in the wilderness one of the greatest evils is private property a man's character is determined by his conditions



The town adopted **a new constitution**, whose objective was to achieve happiness based on principles of equal rights and equality of duties.

Cooperation, common property, economic benefit, freedom of speech and action, kindness and courtesy, order, preservation of health, acquisition of knowledge, were included as part of the constitution.



The constitution laid out the life of a citizen in New Harmony based on age. The town became a scientific center of national significance, especially in the natural sciences.


Institute for the Formation of Character
