






Loss of Faith in the Government

- ministers resorted to manipulation, distraction, and flattery to manage him





18 U.S. Code § 2385 - Advocating overthrow of Government

Whoever knowingly or willfully advocates, abets, advises, or teaches the duty, necessity, desirability, or propriety of or destroying the government of the United States or any political subdivision therein, by force or violence, or



Whoever, with intent to cause the overthrow or destruction of any such government, prints, publishes, edits, issues, circulates, sells, distributes, or publicly displays any written or printed matter advocating, advising, or teaching the duty, necessity, desirability, or propriety of overthrowing or destroying any government in the United States by force or violence, or attempts to do so;


Shall be fined under this title or imprisoned not more than twenty years, or both.

Posse Comitatus Act:

the entire body of the inhabitants who may be summoned by the sheriff to assist in preserving the public peace



Federal law that was passed in 1878, after the end of Reconstruction, and updated in 1981. Its intent was to limit the powers of federal government in using military personnel to enforce state laws.

Philosophy of the French Revolution Enlightenment / Age of Reason

Just as scientists had discovered laws that govern the natural world,

intellectuals began to ask if these might also apply to human beings, particularly to institutions such as governments


- questions such as how governments are formed, and what logical principles tie people to their governments
- rejected divine rights of kings
- Secular reason and logic should be used to answer important questions, and not religion or superstition

Most French citizens ate two pounds of bread each day. The price of flour skyrocketed and caused the cost of a loaf of bread to become equal to a peasant's monthly earnings.

Revolutionaries were called "sans-culottes," to distinguish themselves from the French nobility who wore the silk knee breeches. Instead they wore long trousers called pantaloons, and red caps to symbolize liberty.











Declaration of the Rights of Man and the Citizen

Lithuanian Freedom Fighters Forest Brothers



Units ranged in size from a few individuals to several hundred, with contacts among units maintained by young women. Some insurgents lived full-time in forest bunkers. Others merged by day into civilian life, working in towns or on farms while gathering intelligence. At night they would retrieve their carefully hidden weapons and carry out attacks.

Five decades after Lithuania was occupied and incorporated into the Soviet Union, it became the first republic to declare its independence from the USSR on 11 March 1990, and was later followed by Latvia and Estonia.



The Soviet military responded harshly. The discipline and courage of its citizens—linking arms and singing in the face of tanks — showed the world that Lithuania's citizens were prepared to defend national independence
