Shires, a county, governed by an ealdorman or a royal official known as a "shire reeve" or sheriff

Robin Hood goes to live deep in Sherwood Forest, attracting other societal outcasts

He is the leader of a band of men who are outlaws, hiding from the Sheriff of Nottingham, not because they are bad, but because they are mistreated by authority.



Killing the king's deer just to eat for the winter, or having to commit violence in self-defense, the outlaws become a band of brothers. They strike back by taking back the wealth that has been extracted from everyday people.



Was there a real Robin Hood, or is he a pure creation of myth and folklore?

The rulers of the medieval English kingdom discouraged resistance to authority by the widespread use of execution, outlawry, and exile. Yet medieval English society also applauded such resistance.

Encapsulated in the tales of Robin Hood, the good outlaw is loyal, courageous, and clever; while the authorities he outwits are disloyal, cowardly, and stupid, using the cover of the law to behave corruptly.



1. Robin Hood is only a legend or mythology, a term and not a name, archetype of banditry, occupational surname of a villain

2. a literary character, in lyrics, and in plays, a poetic expression of popular aspirations

3. an individual, historical personage referenced in chronicles

Robyn Hood: Outlaw Princess



Robyn Howard is a teenage schoolgirl who dreams of making a difference and wonders why there are so few famous women in history



In the 12th Century terms such as Robert / Robyn Hode appear in legal records to identify any petty criminal / common epithet for criminals

Robin, Robyn, Robert, Rabunhod, Robehod, Hood, Hude, Heud, Hoad, Hobbehod, Wood, Whoad and Whod

The lyrics of popular ballads began "Robin Hood in the Sherwood stood" i.e., once upon a time

Stories about the "Merry Men" lurking about Sherwood forest began to be used in plays performed at pageants Common Proverb – many written references people boast of their accomplishments "Many will talk of Robin Hood who never shot his bow"





The concept of a "Dark Age" refers to a period with a lack of any contemporary written history

A Peasant, Knight or Fallen Noble?





In the late Middle Ages in England, where agrarian discontent had begun to chip away at the feudal system, he appears as an anti-establishment rebel, a violent yeoman who lived in Sherwood Forest with his men who murders government agents and wealthy landowners.

The practice of building castles dates from the 9th to the 12th centuries, establishing and solidifying class separation government consisted of hereditary feudal estates







Almost all of the people were Serfs, with only perhaps 10% Yeoman living in "wattle and daub" huts

troubadours' songs that reported news and events

The first known reference in English verse to Robin Hood is found in a poem in which a poorly educated priest repents and confesses that he is ignorant of Latin:



"Although I can't recite the Lord's Prayer (Paternoster), I do know the rhymes of Robin Hood."

> in The Vision of Piers Plowman

The **Little John** – Robin Hood's lieutenant Much – the miller's son Merry Will Scarlet – he is a skilled swordsman Men Arthur a Bland David of Doncaster – went by the nickname "Bull" known Will Stutely members **Friar Tuck** – The resident clergyman of the band, more ale-loving and jovial than belligerent Alan-a-Dale – A roving minstrel, a skilled archer nearly equal to Robin **Reynold Greenleaf** – tricked his way into the Sheriff's service Maid Marian – Robin Hood's romantic interest, a cross-dressing tomboy and a capable fighter, works as a double agent, feeding Robin critical information about the Sheriff The Tinker **The Cook** – A cook who lived in the household of the Sheriff **The Ranger** – A forester who was responsible for protecting the king's deer **The Pinder** – A pinder, an impounder of stray animals

The Scotchman

The Three Yeomen – landowning farmers who were about to be hanged by the Sheriff of Nottingham for poaching until they were saved by Robin and a company of archers

Several modern adaptations add a member to the group who is a Moor or Saracen

Friar Tuck

Friars were religious men devoted to wandering, preaching and spreading the Christian word, vs. monks



royal writs were issued demanding the arrest of a priest who led a band which robbed, murdered and committed other acts of general mayhem

an implacable menace set apart from ordinary society a man without a polis who lives in the wilds contrary to nature / god ordained order appalled and feared

Represents the Wilderness / Nature



primitive and primal cast out from civilization into arcadia forest is a place of wild beasts dispossessed

OBEY

creates his own society never alone, still a social creature not an anarchist but building his own world, his own order a utopian primal society a commonwealth of the woods noble spirit of defiance to tyranny



Sheriff and his posse stand for law and order a nemesis distrustful and defiant to representatives of higher authority by yeomen (a farmer who cultivates his own land, a class of small freeholders in England) challenges them to live up to their oath obedience is not absolute but conditional



a celebration of independence power is contractual agreement based upon consent not absolutists, not anarchists liberal individualism but not a manifesto Robin has no theory of society most performed unpaid work as, in Latin, a "servus"



Robin Hood Paradigm stands for an honorable code rooted in moral calculus, situational ethics, and a categorical imperative against the odds stands against authority while serving a higher good tallage – a special tax which could be imposed at any time "when injustice becomes law, resistance becomes a duty" e.g., institutionalized privilege



normative deontological ethics (from the Greek, "obligation, duty") the morality of an action should be based on whether that action itself is right or wrong

Represents the Triumph of Good over Evil per the belief of many that we live in a world where justice prevails



There is No Justification for Theft (at the workplace) all one can do is to possibly mitigate the penalty (suspension, demotion, removal)





Peasants' Revolt or the Great Uprising of 1381 a contingent of rebels advanced on London to end serfdom a Fin de siecle - the "end of a century" the closing of one era and the onset of another

Green Feather Movement

Mrs. Thomas J. White (who is not referenced by her first name) of the Indiana Textbook Commission called for a ban of Robin Hood in all school books for promoting communism.



Social Banditry / Group Identity wealth, power and privilege are based on a tyrannical system or social order

(which meant tale or adventure) is a compilation of various Robin Hood tales, shortly after the first printing press was set-up May Games / May 1st Holiday Plays and Procession for Poor "Lord of Mis-Rule" By 1600, there are more than 130 references to performances of the Robin Hood legend -- more references than to any other kind of British folk drama.

Appropriate Use of Force?

Bank robber to teller "Just hand over the money and there won't be any trouble."





Longbows are around 6 feet long, can shoot an arrow between 250 to 300 yards and are able to puncture armour

Archers do plant arrows in the back of other arrows—it's a rare but not uncommon occurrence called "telescoping"

Due to their specialized training, English longbowmen were sought as mercenaries in other European countries

More than 3,500 arrows and 137 whole longbows were recovered from the Mary Rose, a ship of Henry VIII's navy that capsized and sank at Portsmouth in 1545. Willikin of the Weald - a guerrilla force of bowmen he recruited fought against the invading French Army of Louis VIII, and may have served at least in part as the inspiration for legendary figure Robin Hood.





Hererward the Wake the exile Establishing an English Identity Northumbria marshy area, as a nation conquered, as a people never defeated



Edict to cut back on forests near roads leading into market towns in order to deter thieves

Major Oak

The largest in England is said to have been the hideout of Robin Hood and his Merry Men. Due to a fungal infection, the interior is mainly hollow, which leads many to believe it was used as a secret base.
